**S** - Specific — Clearly defined or outlined.

**M** - Measurable — Able to be measured; Know when it has been achieved.

**A** - Attainable — Achievable, when you identify goals that are most important to you, you begin to figure out ways you can make them come true.

**R** - Realistic — A practical idea of what can be achieved. Within your available resources, knowledge and time.

**T** - Time-bound — Set to a specific due date. Enough time to achieve the goal.

**Bad Examples:**

- I want to get a purple in foods and nutrition.
- I want to give a talk.
- I want to go to state fair.

**Good Example:** "I want to give a presentation about social media etiquette at the County Activity Day in May."

This is an example of a SMART goal because it is specific. There is no doubt of their intention. It is measurable because the 4-Her can measure if they actually did the presentation or not. It is attainable as long as they stay on course and prepare for it. The goal is also relevant & realistic. The 4-Her also set a designated time frame to complete this goal.

Part III: Tell about some of the activities you and your club have participated in.

Part IV: Tell about what offices you held or responsibilities you were given in your club.

Part V: Tell about what you hope to do next 4-H year.

If you complete an animal project area you do not need a non-animal financial page.

A financial record is required for each incentive award you are applying for. For example if you are enrolled in the Beef and Poultry project areas and want to apply for both the Beef and Poultry Incentive Awards, you will need to fill out an Animal Financial Record for Beef (Market or Breeding) and one for Poultry.
